

**AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY RESOURCES
AT THE BRISCOE CENTER FOR AMERICAN HISTORY:
A SUBJECT BIBLIOGRAPHY**

The Dolph Briscoe Center for American History at the University of Texas at Austin offers a wide variety of material for the study of African American life, history, and culture in Texas. As with all ethnic groups, the study of African Americans in Texas can be approached from many perspectives--through the use of monographs, scholarly articles, photographs, printed and recorded music, dissertations and theses, newspapers, the personal papers of individuals, and business and government records. This subject bibliography will acquaint researchers with the many resources relating to African American history and culture available at the Briscoe Center for American History.

For the purposes of this selection, scope was limited mainly to African Americans in the state of Texas. Other materials at the Briscoe Center supplement these entries and expand the national scope. Note that items dealing with the military and with sports have been assigned arbitrarily to the section on Business, Professions, and Labor.
